



Sermon Notes: His Name Is Yahweh

1. What does this name mean?

- a. Etymology: He is real, He is self-existent, and He is eternally unchangeable.
- b. Use: He is the faithful, covenant-keeping God.

2. How is this name demonstrated?

- a. God has unrivaled power for His people.
- b. God has unconditional promises to and for His people.
 - 1) God will save and satisfy them.
 - 2) God will love them.
- c. God has unwavering presence with His people.

3. How is this name demonstrated in Jesus?

- a. Jesus explicitly refers to himself as "I AM."
- b. Jesus is the exact representation of Yahweh.
- c. Jesus fulfills and enlarges Yahweh's promises.

4. What does this name mean for me?

- a. Worship.
- b. Trust.
- c. Draw near and enjoy.



Application Questions: His Name Is Yahweh

1. How did you give the Most High God, Elohim, the highest place in *your* life this past week? How was He strong for you?
2. What did you know about the name “Yahweh” before this message? What new piece of information stuck out to you?
3. Why do you think God waited until Exodus 3 to reveal Himself as Yahweh? And why was this timing especially appropriate in light of the circumstances surrounding God’s people?
4. Why do you think God uses the name Yahweh more than any other name for Himself in Scripture?
5. Of God’s unrivaled power, unconditional promises, and unwavering presence, which do you have the hardest time trusting? Living in light of? Explain.
6. How/why does faithfulness in a relationship require both power (ability) and love (affection)?
7. What are some ways the work of Jesus is parallel to the events of the Exodus? Why does this matter?
8. When you meditate on God *as Yahweh*, what impression or thought stands out to you the most? How, specifically, will this impact the way you worship Him?
9. What are some ways your prayers might change if you consciously pray to God *as Yahweh*?
10. What will it look like for you to draw near to and abide with Yahweh this week?
11. What are some ways you can go beyond knowing *about* God to actually knowing and enjoying God? Why is this an important dimension of what it means to really worship God?
